Hello members

It has been a funny 3 months since our last Newsletter, one that has seen frustration at the forefront on everything we are trying to achieve for patients, carers, your families and on your behalf at a local and national Level.

Firstly we are having problems getting our volunteers who wish to help with the Art Project checked out, this is because the volunteer department have all the volunteers they need for the hospital, so won't process ours, Sister Ibbotson has been trying her best to sort this issue out so we can proceed with this project onto the ward and outside, however, I have hoped that I have found a way around the outreach part and will be approaching 2 art groups that are already up and running in Stanley & South Shields so we can at least get this part in place.

Obviously I understand that those on dialysis, pre dialysis, peritoneal, home dialysis and their families are struggling with their own predicament of living with Renal Disease, all I am asking is that you talk to people you know about your condition, if you know of anyone who is retired and could possibly help on the stalls for a few hours please ask them to help, we will pay for travel costs or if possible organise a lift.

I have asked Keith our secretary to do a small piece about what work we do for you, just so you understand the work that is involved in keeping the Charity going to help people like yourselves. We are going to be printing a leaflet that can be handed to friends etc that you feel may be able to help us. We would like to see some patients or transplant patients helping at our stalls in National Transplant Week, as this is on all week, we desperately need help for this event.

The more awareness of transplantation and the need to promote donation is the mainstay of the charities constitution and nobody can be more passionate for that than ourselves patients. Thank you, in anticipation of your help.

We have decided due to the lack of patient participation for our educational talks we will now be doing them twice a year, this is so that we have enough time to promote the talks and plan to find neutral venues away from the Freeman Hospital, we will be supplementing with a Regional day, and with other Educational programmes concerning Renal issues that you feel appropriate, as well as repeating the Centre of Life Morning working in cooperation with the North East Research Fund members.

Research and clinical trials are an everyday part of the work done in the NHS.

The people who carry out research are mostly the same doctors and healthcare professionals who treat people. Their aim is to find better ways of looking after patients and keeping people healthy.

There are many different types of research and they cover a range of activities, from working in a scientific laboratory to carefully noting patterns of health and disease and developing new treatments.

Health and social care research looks at many different issues, from illness, disease and disability to the way that health and social care services are provided by the NHS.

Why carry out research?

People being cared for in the NHS benefit from past research and continue to benefit from research that is currently being carried out.

Healthcare professionals know a great deal about health, disease and medicines, but much remains uncertain. Research can find answers to the things that are unknown, filling gaps in knowledge and changing the way that healthcare professionals work. This means treatment, care and patients' quality of life are improved and avoidable early deaths are prevented.

Where is research carried out?

There is a huge range of different types of research into health and disease. Much research is carried out in the NHS, but some takes place in universities and research institutes, in social care services or in the private sector.

How can I get involved?

You can look for research studies yourself, by asking your doctor or a patient organisation, or by looking on the internet such as <u>www.makingresearchbetter.co.uk</u>

If you wish to look at being involved in a medical trial you can use the web link above or this is the application form.

You should discuss this with your consultant if you require more information as there is great demand for people to take part in research in many areas including renal. Being part of a clinical trial could if you wish be in areas of assisting with research or being a patient advocate, you can help without actually being the patient. PAM YANEZ OBE RETIREMENT



I originally got to know Pam as Pam Buckley in '98 and got to know her through the Newcastle Transplant Games Team, when she was the captain.

Pam's career in renal care started with her working as a dialysis nurse. She took on the job of transplant coordinator and built up one of the best teams of transplant coordinators in the country.

Pam was involved in an initiative to get organs for transplantation from accident victims in the General Hospital working with David Talbot. Very demanding as permission had to be obtained from relatives very rapidly so organs could be removed within an hour of death.

About 10 years ago Pam moved to take administrative charge of both the renal and urinary care services. This has also involved her in serving as a governor for the Newcastle Hospitals Trust. This included the administration of many aspects of renal care including the development of the new renal unit and Ward 38.

Pam was the captain of the Newcastle Transplant Games team for many years. She built up one of the largest and most successful teams. She also organised the national games at Gateshead twice.

Pam was awarded an OBE for all her work. An award that was richly deserved for a whole range of reasons and I've only touched on some of them. One of the things we will miss most is her tremendous personal support, encouragement for all of us who have met her and her sheer vitality.

Pam remarried in Peru and we want to wisher her and her family all the best for her retirement. It will be interesting to see what she takes up next.

REPATRIATION OF MEDICINES

In the last newsletter was an article about changes in the way immunosuppressants are going to be prescribed for transplant patients. The article was not very clear so what is going to happen?

At the moment the ways in which immunosuppressant drugs are prescribed varies from GP practice to practice. Some prescribe them and some don't. If they don't repeat prescriptions have to be got from the Freeman. This system is going to change for all transplant patients.

The change is that repeat prescriptions will be made at the renal unit. Details of exactly how this will work will be sent out before this change happens.

Why is this called repatriation with resultant confusion? Civil servants have a habit of using slightly obscure words as has happened here. Repatriation actually means to return someone to their country of origin. So we have to assume that it is used here because transplant patients got their original prescription from the renal unit.




climb, both groups will begin the climb together.

National Transplant Week

Only 31% of us in the UK have joined the organ donor register - yet more than 10,000 of us need a transplant. So who's giving them?

The answer is not enough people. The serious lack of donations mean 1000 per year are dying needlessly. So the purpose of the week is to draw awareness to the problem and make a change.

Kidney transplants are most common, as well as hearts, livers and other organs. Donated corneas also give people a new way of looking at the world!

So how does it work? Donors are matched according to blood and tissue type. People from the same ethnic group are likely to be a closer match - although people from different ethnic groups usually match just as well.

When you register and get your donor card you can choose which organs you want to donate - but not who they're donated to.

The long-term organ transplant benefits are invaluable. Not only does it give someone a second chance, transplants are less expensive than having to keep paying for medication that would ultimately only be a temporary solution.

When someone dies, it's really hard to accept that they're gone. But knowing that a part of their loved one will help someone else will be a huge help for the person grieving.



Hearts, kidneys livers and corneas are all vital organs needed by people to survive and go on to enjoy their lives. <u>Click here</u> to join the organ donor register.

So what can you do this July? Well you could run an awareness day in your workplace by setting up a display table and giving out leaflets - or if that's not possible you could just hand out some posters to shops and offices near you to help raise awareness of the week.

In the meantime keeps tabs on the <u>National Transplant</u> <u>Week</u> website to get fundraising ideas and find out more

about organ transplants.

Organ Donation and Transplantation

Summary of Donor and Transplant Activity

In the financial year to 31 March 2013, compared with the previous year

• There was an 11% increase in the number of deceased donors to 1,212, the highest number ever in the UK.

• The number of donors after brain death increased by 8% to 705, while the number of donors after circulatory death increased by 16% to 507

• The number of living donors increased by 4% to 1,101; living donors account for

Half of the total number of organ donors

• The number of patients whose lives were saved or improved by an organ transplant increased by 6% to 4,212

• 3,697 patients had their sight restored through a cornea transplant, representing an increase of 2%

The total number of patients registered for a transplant has fallen slightly, so that:

• There were 7,332 patients waiting for a transplant at the end of March 2013, with a further 3,030 temporarily suspended from transplant lists

• 466 patients died while on the active waiting list for their transplant and a further 766 were removed from the transplant list.

The removals were mostly as a result of deteriorating health and ineligibility for transplant and many of these patients would have died shortly afterwards.

Some of the other key messages from this report are that, compared with last year, there has been:

- A decrease of 3% in the number of pancreas transplants
- An increase of 4% in the total number of liver transplants
- An increase of 5% in the total number of cardiothoracic organ transplants
- An increase of 7% in the total number of kidney transplants
- An increase of 5% in the number of eligible organ donors identified to 4,302 in 2012-2013
- An increase in all key metrics of the organ donation pathway, resulting in nearly 200 additional families consenting to/ authorising donation (from 1,488 to 1,675)

About PatientView

PatientView shows patients' latest test results plus information about their diagnosis and treatment. They can share this information with anyone they want, and view it from anywhere in the world. PatientView has developed from a project launched for patients of Renal Units, but has expanded to be able to show information for others too. It requires your local unit to have joined. (E.g. renal unit, diabetes unit, IBD unit

The information comes directly from existing records, for example hospital and GP records, so if you suspect a mistake, and you should tell your own unit so it can be corrected there. Links to do that are provided after you log in.

Editor writes

As a long time user of Patient View I would recommend it for a number of reasons regardless of your current situation, pre-dialysis, HD or PD or Transplanted.

>Blood results appear approximately 18-24 hours later, there is every chance you may see it before your Doctor

>No need to wait a few weeks for the clinic letter that will include the results, this may give you some piece of mind.

>The information on the various elements looked at in blood test such as creatinine (see below), are included separately in columns so not only can you see your results history but there is an explanation of what they mean.

Result	Comments Suggests a very small person, or someone with little muscle (including small children). 'Normal' - but there could still be reduced kidney function			
less than 60				
60-120				
120-200	Mild to moderate kidney failure - but in someone with little muscle, 200 could sometimes mean more severe kidney failure.			
300+	Moderate to severe kidney failure. Most dialysis patients have creatinine measurements over 300 all of the time.			

And finally if you dialysis on ward 31 you can get a week's head start on the Dietician and plan your excuses on why your phosphate and potassium are higher than they want. I don't think this is why Patient View was set up but I personally found this handy for my monthly telling off!!

HOLIDAY DIALYSIS

Most people need a break from time to time, and kidney patients are no exception! Holidays are a great way to reinforce the fact that you can still enjoy the good things in life as a kidney patient – and they also provide a welcome break for carers.



Business travel is also a common requirement of many jobs nowadays, and again there is often no reason why kidney patients should not be able to make business trips from time to time – either in the UK, or abroad.

For most patients — whatever therapy they are on — travel and holidays will be actively encouraged by the medical team, who will help with the arrangements. Of course it is essential that you check with your renal

unit before planning or booking anything – even if you have had a transplant you will still need a letter from them confirming you are fit to travel in order to secure travel insurance, and advice on immunisation.

Travel for kidney patients on dialysis does require more planning, so last minute bookings are not a realistic option. However, the limitations in terms of where you can take a holiday and what sort of holiday you can take are probably far fewer than you would imagine. There is also plenty of help available to assist with the planning process and to help make sure you have a holiday to remember for all the right reasons.

The Freeman Hospital can help you to make arrangements for dialysis away from base whether you are PD or HD.

Recipe from "Cooking for David: A Culinary Dialysis Cookbook" by Sara Colman, RD, CSR, CDE and Dorothy Gordon, RN. Recipe modified and submitted by DaVita dietician Heather from Georgia.

Portions: 4 serving size: 2 fajitas

- 8 flour tortillas, 6" size
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 12 ounces boneless chicken breasts
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoons cumin
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
- 1/4 cup red pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped

Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 300° F. Wrap tortillas in foil; heat in oven for 10 minutes.
- 2. Cut chicken breasts into 1" strips.
- 3. Place oil in non-stick frying pan over medium heat; add chicken, seasonings and lemon juice. Cook for 3 to 5 minutes.

- 4. Add peppers and onion to frying pan; cook for 3 to 5 minutes more or until chicken is no longer pink and juice run clear. Add cilantro to chicken mixture.
- 5. Divide chicken mixture between tortillas; fold tortillas over.

- 8 ounces cooked chicken breast
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
 - 10 ounce bag of broccoli slaw
- 1/4 cup hoisin sauce

• 1/3 cup water

Preparation

- 1. Shred cooked chicken breast meat.
- 2. In a large wok, heat oil and add the broccoli slaw; cook for 5 minutes.
- 3. While the broccoli slaw is cooking, in a small bowl combine 1/3-cup hoisin sauce and 1/3-cup water and mix together well.
- 4. Add shredded chicken meat to wok and stir chicken and broccoli slaw together
- 5. Pour hoisin sauce mixture over stir-fry and stir together.

Renal Social Workers What we do And how we support Renal Patients

There are three part-time Social Workers based in the Renal Unit at the Freeman Hospital. They are Marian Wainwright, Lynne Cullen and Corinne Nichol. Our work covers Ward 32 (inpatient ward), Ward 31 (dialysis ward), Renal Clinical Investigations Unit, Out-patients, all home dialysis patients (haemodialysis or peritoneal dialysis), and pre-dialysis patients.

The Social Workers are required to work within a statutory and legislative framework and are required to take into account both the patients and their carer's needs. They are also responsible for understanding appropriate safeguarding procedures.

The Social Workers work as part of a multi-disciplinary team in the renal unit and regularly discuss patients with other professionals within the renal unit to ensure that the appropriate services/support is being considered.

Most referrals come from nurses or doctors involved with patients but people are able to refer themselves to us.

The majority of referrals about patients on Ward 32 are made because patients may require an assessment for services to support them when they are discharged home. (It may be because the person has been struggling to manage at home or that they will need short term support on discharge from hospital until they have recovered from their acute illness).

Patients who are referred from other parts of the unit may be referred because they are struggling to cope with their illness or physical condition. They may be struggling financially and need assistance to apply for benefits or grants or may need information about moving to more appropriate accommodation. The Social Workers will consider the practical, social, emotional and psychological needs of the patient and other appropriate support where possible. The Freeman Renal Unit is a regional unit and so the Social Workers regularly need to provide assessments for other local authorities or liaise with organisations across the North of England.

Occasionally we are approached with questions or queries that we are unable to deal with ourselves but in these situations we will try and find out who would be appropriate to deal with the issue and pass on the information.
